Principal's Message

Farewell to a Great School

School is not just a building. School is not just a group of classrooms with children in them. School is not just reading, writing and arithmetic. My definition of the word "SCHOOL" is more of a concept. It is the interaction of hundreds of different people with a common focus...educating children to their highest level of ability. But the term "education" is not just learning content, facts and processes, but how to be successful in life.



Mohr is such a concept. Everyone involved in the school gets the pleasure to work on projects to insure students are successful in life. Teachers and staff operate the location, and deliver the instruction in a myriad of different subjects ranging from reading to the arts to developing good character. Parents who give so much support to the school get to see their efforts from volunteerism blossom into many materials and services available to students, making their programs more interesting, motivating and exciting. Late Registration Procedure for Summer School



On-time registration for Summer School has now concluded. All applications accepted after May 16 will be processed only on a space-available basis for classes that still have room. Late registration will end on June 6.

Please note the following classes are full and have been closed:

Computer/Science Academy, Grades 3-8; Art and Drama Academy, Grades 1-3; College Boot Camp for Seniors (June 23 - June 26 is full).

There is still room available in most General Education (Grades 1-8), Art and Drama Academy (Grades 4-6 only), Summer Drama Conservatory (Grades 5-8), Character Education Camp (Grades 2-6), Academic Support (Grades 1-8) and remedial high school classes. SUMMER READING FUN

Summer vacation is a time to rest, relax, and spend time with family. It can also be a special time to curl up with your kids and enjoy some wonderful books.



Reading aloud to your children lets them experience the exciting world of literature. You will help build their vocabulary, comprehension, and inspire their imaginations as they listen to you read from a variety of texts that they cannot yet read independently. Read a book, a poem, a chapter, or a nonfiction article to your child *every night*. It's important for children to hear what good, fluent reading sounds like. Talk briefly about what you've read. Ask each other questions. Enjoy!

Set aside a time for reading *every day*. Some research claims that children can lose one-half year's worth of skills if they fail to read over the summer. Don't let this happen to your child! Make summer reading a positive experience. Encourage your child to use their good reader strategies to figure out new words and work toward independence. Praise for accomplishments. Encourage your child to reread books you have enjoyed reading together. Summer's a great time to read in bed before "lights off". If you keep bedtime the same as during the school year, there will be time to read before falling asleep. Mem Fox, in *Reading Magic*, speaks of these essentials: "encouragement, time, books, magazines, light, silence, warmth in winter and coolness in summer, and the comfort of being allowed to read in bed every night..."

Have your child create a summer picture journal. They can take photos, put these photos into a simple homemade book and write about each picture. It's fun to read and reread something so personal! Your child will enjoy reading the book to family and friends. Happy reading!

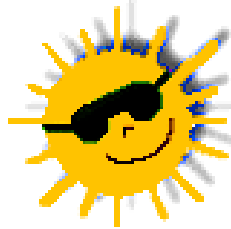

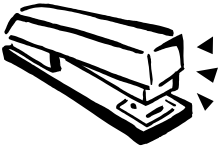
Field Day Reminder

Health and Wellness - Summer Safety

As we look ahead to fun activities like trips to the lake, picnics, and camping, let's keep safety in mind as well. While families enjoy the seemingly carefree moments of summer, emergency room doctors know it as "trauma season." This summer children ages 14 and under will be rushed to emergency rooms nearly 3 million times for serious injuries resulting from motor vehicle crashes, drownings, bike crashes, pedestrian incidents, falls and other hazards.



Parents Need to Be Extra Vigilant. Serious injuries peak during the summer months (May to August) because children are supervised less, have more free time and engage in more outdoor activities. Close supervision, proper protective gear, and other simple prevention steps will help your child avoid danger.

Crossing streets. Kids will be on the move going to the park and visiting friends. Teach them to cross streets safely.

Proper protective gear. Make sure your kids put on helmets for biking, skateboarding, and in-line skating.

Around water. Actively supervise children in and around pools, hot tubs, and open bodies of water, giving them undivided attention. Appoint a designated "water watcher," taking turns with other adults. Keep a phone nearby in case of an emergency.

- Enroll your child in swimming lessons after age 4 – typically the earliest age when they're likely to practice and retain information. Teach children how to tread water, float and stay by the shore.
- Learn infant and child CPR.
- Teach children not to dive into oceans, lakes or rivers because you never know how deep the water is or what might be hidden under the surface of the water.
- All children should wear life vests when boating.

In the sun. To protect you and your family, wear sunscreen with SPF 15 or more. Put it on 30 minutes before going outside. Wear a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses that provide UV protection. Try to stay out of the sun when it's strongest-between 10am and 4pm.

Near bugs. It's safe to use bug repellent on kids 2 months and older. Look for repellent that contains DEET, picaridin, or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Avoid using scented soaps and perfume, which attract bees. Stay away from standing water and blooming gardens, where bugs gather. After hiking in the woods or tall grass, check your child's body for ticks. You can use tweezers to remove ticks. See a doctor if you think that a bug bite has made you sick. Symptoms include fever, headaches, and a rash.

At meals. To guard against food illness, wash your hands before cooking and serving food. Be sure meat is fully cooked. Keep cold foods in a cooler with plenty of ice. Fruits and vegetable should be washed in cool water.

Remember active supervision is the best way to keep your kids safe!
